

“Fall” Phrasal Verbs - Definitions

fall back on: to have a “backup plan”; to have a plan that you can use in an emergency

- You should get a college degree, so just in case you are not successful as a singer, you will have something to fall back on.
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fall behind: to progress more slowly than others; to be at a lower level than others

- If you don’t pay attention in class, you will fall behind and fail the test.
 - I was sick for a week, so I fell behind in class. Now I have to do extra work just to catch up.
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fall for: 1) to be attracted to someone; to fall in love with someone

2) to believe a lie; to be tricked by someone; to be gullible

- Jane fell for Bill the first time she laid eyes on him. It was love at first sight.
 - I told Mike that it was snowing in the desert and he believed me! That guy falls for everything!
 - She always falls for “bad boys” because she thinks they are attractive. The problem is, they always treat her badly.
 - We tried to convince Joel that there are 32 days in April, but he didn’t fall for it.
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fall into: to “end up” doing something that you hadn’t planned to do or didn’t originally want to do

- Jerad used to be a model student, but recently he fell into the wrong crowd and has been getting into trouble.
 - Many gangsters never plan to become criminals. They simply fall into the lifestyle from a young age.
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fall off: to decrease (especially: sales, numbers, profits, etc.)

- After the holiday peak season, sales usually fall off until the summer.
 - During the 2009 financial crisis, sales of new homes fell off dramatically.
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fall through: if a plan is unsuccessful or an expectation is not met, you say it “fell through”

- You should get a college degree, so just in case your singing career falls through, you’ll have something to fall back on.
- We were going to go camping this weekend, but our plans fell through due to the rain.
