


BUYING TICKETS

When you are buying plane tickets for your vacation, you have many options. You can buy the tickets directly from the **airline**, or you can go to a **travel agency** and speak to a **travel agent** who will help you find the best **deals**. Many people **prefer** **online travel agencies** such as Travelocity, Expedia, or Orbitz, where they can compare prices, **book flights and hotels**, and even **reserve a rental car**.



You can sometimes find cheaper tickets if you travel as part of a **tour group**. A travel agent can help you buy a **package deal**, which includes your flight, hotel, meals, activities and entertainment. The tour group **arranges** all of the activities, and the members of the tour group **go sightseeing** to famous **tourist sites** together. Many people like travelling this way, but others prefer to be more **independent** and **strike out on their own**.

VOCABULARY

airline – an 'airplane company'

travel agent – a person who helps other people buy plane tickets and arranges travel plans for people

travel agency – a company that helps people arrange their travel plans. (travel agents work in travel agencies)

online travel agency – a travel agency that is on the Internet

deal(s) – special prices; cheap prices; sales

book - to arrange a time or buy a ticket for something (flight, hotel, train, bus, etc.)

flight – a trip on an airplane ('fly' is a verb; 'flight' is a noun)

reserve – to book; to keep something aside so you can use it later

rental car – a car that you pay for to use for a short time

tour group – a group of people that go on vacation together

package deal – a kind of 'deal' that includes many different things purchased together (such as flight, hotel, and meals).

arrange – to prepare, set up, organize

go sightseeing – when on vacation, to go to the most interesting places and take pictures

tourist sites – places that many tourists like to go (tourists are people who are on vacation in a place)

independent – doesn't need other people's help, can take care of yourself

IDIOM

strike out on your own - to leave a group of people and go do something that you want to do, by yourself

SENTENCE PATTERN: I prefer A to B

This means that you like A more than B.

***NOTE:** *If A and B are verbs, you need to add –ing.*

Examples: I like steak, but I don't like hamburgers.

→ *I prefer steak to hamburgers.*

I enjoy playing tennis more than watching TV.

→ *I prefer playing tennis to watching TV.*

CHAPTER 1.2

Dialogue: At the Travel Agency

Dave wants to visit his mother in England, so he goes to a travel agency.

Dave: Hi, I'd like to check on a flight.

Travel Agent: Sure. What is your destination?

Dave: London, England.

Travel Agent: And is this one-way or round trip?

Dave: Round trip.

Travel Agent: When would you like to depart?

Dave: January 12th, returning on January 26th.

Travel Agent: Okay, one moment please. . . . Do you have an airline preference?

Dave: No. Any airline will be fine. I'm not picky.

Travel Agent: And what class would you like? Economy, business class, or first class?

Dave: Economy, please.

Travel Agent: Okay, well there's a flight on the morning of the 12th, returning on the afternoon of the 26th. The cheapest we have is \$1,400.

Dave: Ouch! I was hoping to find something cheaper. My dates are flexible – do you think you can find a cheaper flight on different dates?

Travel Agent: Let me check. Just a moment. . . . There's a flight on the 10th, returning on the 25th, for \$968.

Dave: That's much better!

Travel Agent: But you have to change planes twice – once in New York, and again in Holland. And there's a 6-hour layover in Holland.

Dave: Hmmm. . . Is that the best you can do?

Travel Agent: I'm afraid so. If you'd like, I can reserve a seat now, and you don't need to pay right away.

Dave: That would be great.

Travel Agent: I just need your full name and passport number.

Dave: Here you are. (Hands the travel agent his passport.)

Travel Agent: Okay, one moment. . . . Alright! It's reserved. If you decide you want to purchase the ticket, you need to confirm before the end of the month.

Dave: Great! You've been very helpful. Thanks!

Travel Agent: That's my job! Take care!

destination – where you want to go

one-way – a ticket that only includes a flight to a place (not back)

round trip – a ticket that includes the flight to a place and back

depart – leaving a place

return – coming back to a place

preference – what you prefer ("prefer" is a verb; "preference" is a noun)

picky – very hard to make happy; needing many things

class – different levels of service

Economy class – the cheapest class of tickets on an airplane

Business class – nicer than economy class; includes bigger seats and better food and movies

First class – the best class of tickets on an airplane, with very nice seats and the best service

flexible – willing to change plans

layover – the time you spend in an airport waiting for your next flight

confirm – to decide and purchase the ticket
