Punctuation: Commas and Conjunctions ("and")

When you write "and" in a sentence, you have to be careful: Do you need a comma?

Look at these sentences:

• I went to the theater. I watched a movie.

These are both complete sentences, so you can connect them with a comma (,) and "and":

I went to the theater, and I watched a movie.

But you can also write this a different way:

• I went to the theater and watched a movie.

You do <u>not</u> need a comma in this sentence, because "watched a movie" is not a complete sentence (it doesn't have the subject "I").

Examples (all of these sentences are correct!):

- John ate a sandwich, and he watched TV.
- John ate a sandwich and watched TV.
- Martha visited her daughter, and she had a good time.
- Martha visited her daughter and had a good time.
