

# **Idioms: L**

#### Laughter is the best medicine

- Laughing is good for health and healing.

#### Learn the ropes

- When you "learn the ropes," you learn how to do a job (during your first week in a new job, for example), or you learn how something is done (in a company or organization, usually).

#### Let sleeping dogs lie

- Don't bother/mess with a situation, because if you do, it will probably get worse or cause trouble.

#### (The) left hand doesn't know what the right hand is doing

This is used to describe a situation in which the communication is very poor, and people (within a company, office, or government, etc.) don't know what each other are doing.

# Let the cat out of the bag

- to (accidentally) reveal secret information

# Let your hair down

- When you "let your hair down," you relax and have a good time (often after a hard or stressful day).

# Light at the end of the tunnel

- If there is "light at the end of the tunnel," this means that, although a situation is bad right now, there is reason to hope that it will get better in the future.
