

look after: to take care of a person/animal

- Would you mind looking after my dog while I'm on vacation?
- I can look after your daughter while you go to the grocery store.

look down on: to not respect someone; to have a low opinion of

• The seniors in school look down on the freshmen. They think they're better than everyone just because they're older.

look forward to: to be eager or excited for something; to anticipate an event

• I'm really looking forward to visiting you this summer!

look into: to examine, research, or investigate a situation

- Police are looking into the fire that destroyed three houses last week.
- I'll look into this problem and get back to you when I find a solution.

look out!: means "be careful!"; this is used to warn someone about danger (also: watch out!)

• Look out! There's a car coming! Don't cross the street yet!

look (x) up: to check for the definition of a word (in a dictionary, for example)

• If you forget the meaning of any of these phrasal verbs, you can look them up in a dictionary or on the internet.

look up to: to respect someone (usually an older relative or a famous person) and follow their example

- You shouldn't smoke cigarettes around your little brother. He looks up to you!
- The basketball player tries to set a good example because so many children look up to him.
