

run across: to find information accidentally; to find information that you weren't necessarily looking for (also: come across)

- I ran across this interesting story in the newspaper last night. Check it out!
- I just ran across some old pictures of you on Facebook. You looked so different!

run up against (or: run into): to encounter difficulties or opposition

- The president ran up against opposition from senators when he tried to pass his health care bill.
- Jane thought she could easily win the tournament, but she unexpectedly ran up against trouble today when she nearly lost to her opponent in the first round.

run for: to campaign for elected office

- These politicians are all corrupt! I think I should run for mayor!
- Billy is making posters because he is running for class president.

run into: 1) to accidentally hit someone or something (with a car, or when walking, for example)
2) to meet someone you were not planning to see

- We ran into Mr. and Mrs. Smith in Paris last week! It was such a coincidence!
- I wasn't paying attention when I was walking, and I accidentally ran into a wall.

run on: to be powered by (electricity, solar power, batteries, etc.)

- This mp3 player runs on two AA batteries.
- Some new experimental cars can run on solar power alone.

run out of: to "use up"; to not have any left (money, gas, time, etc.)

- I wanted to give my students a test, but unfortunately I ran out of time.
- I ran out of gas on the way to work and had to walk to the nearest gas station.
